Comment faire pliage livre en poule

Je me retrouve avec Clo et Blan pour une nouvelle activité créative. C'est une expérience que j'avais déjà vécue, mais cette fois-ci, je suis plus à l'aise avec la spécialiste du genre, Clo. Elle nous propose de plier un livre d'au moins 550 à 600 pages, avec une reliure cousue plutôt qu'un collage. On doit faire des trois plis sur chaque page, en alternant jusqu'à la fin du livre. **###** PAGE 1 : * En commençant par le haut, on rabat le bouton de papier sur la reliure. * On ramène ensuite le bouton du bas de la page sur la base du pliage ci-dessus. * Enfin, on rabat le bouton du triangle à la limite des deux plis précédents. **###** PAGE 2 : * On commence par partir du bouton en bas et de rabattre le long de la reliure. * On replie ensuite cette même pointe encore sur la reliure. * Enfin, on marque le pli de ce qui dépasse en haut de la page et on rabat vers l'intérieur. **###** Voilà il ne nous reste plus qu'à plier le reste du livre, en alternant ces deux pages. Il n'est pas nécessaire d'avoir de règles ou de matériel spécifique pour réussir cette activité. Cependant, le plioir est très utile et vous pouvez retrouver ce pliage en vidéo sur le site Internet. Il faut compter plusieurs heures pour terminer le livre. Here's a lovely little chicken. I found it on this blog where there are some really great ideas too! Here's my adorable little chick. You'll need an old book and patience! And the photo technique to make this cute little chicken! I'll show you the folding with paper leaves, it's easier to see. Tom Tom JP took pictures of each step while I folded! Open the book in the middle. Tear the right-hand page up towards the top at 3/4, then fold. For the folds, look closely at the photos... Same thing with the left-hand page... And that's what you get, you can make it thicker by folding multiple pages for my chicken I only folded two pages... The next page, on the left, will be folded like this and on the right like that. That's what it looks like with multiple book pages... For my chicken, I folded about ten pages... Last fold, the simplest one, from side to side, you get this with a book page. I folded fifteen of them. We have the shape of the chicken now! And there's my finished chicken! With its lovely red crest and yellow beak made of cardboard paper! That's a nice idea, isn't it? It'll make for a good animation project for Easter! (Note: The original text is in French, so I've tried to keep the same tone and style as much as possible while translating. We made a cute little chicken using a cardboard tube, adding two ribbon bands for the antennas and creating a Nadège pot with a jewelry holder.
